The Bay Creek Park hosts a weekly artisans' and farmer's market on Wednesdays through October (except July 21st)

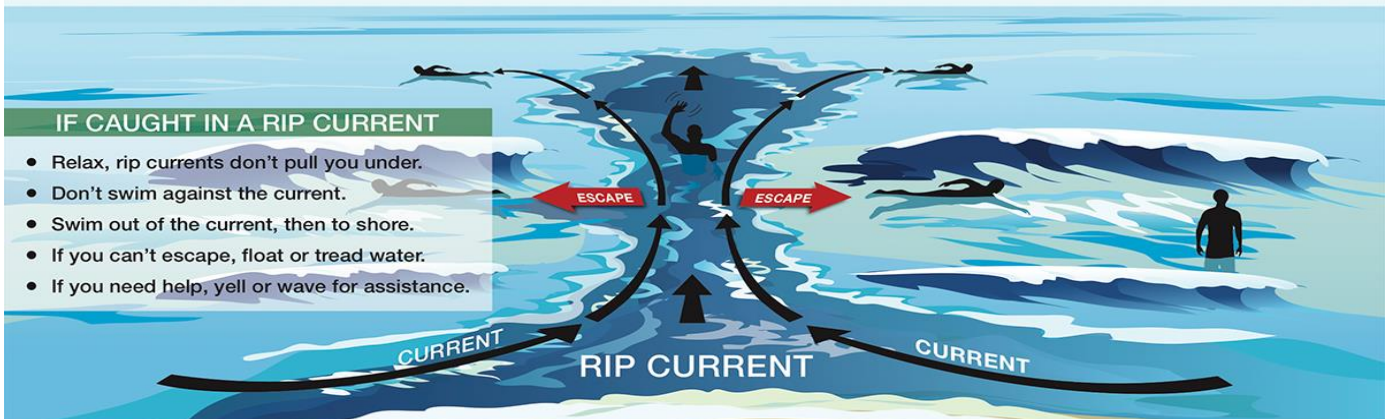

RIP CURRENTS

KNOW YOUR OPTIONS

IF CAUGHT IN A RIP CURRENT

- Relax, rip currents don't pull you under.
- Don't swim against the current.
- Swim out of the current, then to shore.
- If you can't escape, float or tread water.
- If you need help, yell or wave for assistance.



Rip currents are powerful currents of water moving away from shore. They can sweep even the strongest swimmer away from shore. If at all possible, swim near a lifeguard.

Rip Current Safety Toolkit

Rip currents are not just a hazard for those who live near the beach. Many beachgoers visit from inland locations and other non-coastal states. Always respect the power of the ocean. The National Weather Service Marine Program worked with the United States Lifesaving Association to develop a rip current safety toolkit.

National Weather Service Hazard Simplification Project

Major changes are coming to the NWS Watch, Warning and Advisory System.
